Integrating Visual Art into the Classroom

Come to Princeton and delve in to the university's extensive collection of ancient Egyptian, Etruscan, Greek and Roman art! With an eye to discovering ways of incorporating visual art in to the classroom, participants from all content areas will discover intriguing connections to the Ancients. Are you a math instructor; look to Egyptian geometrics - in the realm of science we will follow the paths of ancient healers. Origins and depictions of religion and ancient culture await the social studies teachers, while English/Language Arts instructors will sample the early aspects of written language and religious drama.

Classes will take place at Princeton University Art Museum and include discussions and gallery sessions that focus on aspects of religion and daily life, as well as techniques of object-based teaching. The group will travel to New York City for an extensive study of the Metropolitan Museum of Art's superb collection of ancient art.

Participants depart Jacksonville International Airport the morning of Sunday, June 24 and return the afternoon of Sunday, July 1, 2012. Five days, Monday – Friday are spent in seminar. Saturday is a free day to explore campus or travel into NYC.
